Resource: What's Good About Sharing Books

Upcoming supplies families should collect: Year 2, Week 12 supplies

- One or two flat pieces of 8"x10" cardboard
- Cardboard containers of various sizes, scraps of wood, play dough or clay, or foam cut into boxes
- Tape measure or yard stick (optional)
- One paper plate for each letter of child's name
- 2 buttons or coins that are different from each other

Things to remember during role play

Literacy:

This is a great activity for modeling. If the child has difficulty drawing an object, the parent can model it for them. Children who do not like drawing and coloring can cut and glue paper or paint – all of these activities develop fine motor skills.

Math:

Encourage parents to have their child talk about the shapes they used. If the child enjoyed this activity, they can use their "plastic shapes" to create other designs. Point out to parents that this activity breaks down each shape by using comparing and contrasting them.

Science:

Parents should guide, but not build, the structure for the child. Help parents find materials in their home that can be used for building, like shoe boxes, pots, cookie sheets, canned food, straws, sticks, etc.

Gross Motor:

Some parents may not feel comfortable jumping, This is an ideal activity for reverse role play.

Language:

"Treasure" and "clue" may be new vocabulary for HIPPY children. Be sure to help parents use child-friendly definitions any time new terms are introduced.

The Alphabet Book:

All vowels are introduced using the short I sound.

Words that might need defining:

Dramatic play: Engaging in pretend play or acting out a scenario.

- Small toy with wheels
- Several old newspapers, scrap paper, or old magazines

Things to remember during role play

Literacy:

Encourage parents to encourage their child as they draw. Parents can help suggest how to draw a cookie and cookie jar. Example: Draw or trace a circle and use a crayon to make chocolate chips on the cookie.

Math:

This activity is about listening skills. This is excellent practice for children who will be entering Kindergarten in the fall.

Science:

Remind parents to give wait time = think time

Gross Motor:

Be prepared to demonstrate a jumping-jack jump for parents. Remember to wear appropriate attire for this activity.

Language:

It is important for the child to tell the parent about each picture. Expressing the story details and focusing on when each event happened reinforces story comprehension.

Alphabet Book:

Make sure that parents are using the correct line order for making the letter.

Words that might need defining:

Listening Skills: Having the ability to understand, retain and recall what was heard.

Balance: The ability to maintain an even distribution of weight enabling someone or something to remain upright and steady.

- Tub, pot, or sink
- Water
- 10 of the following items: core, metal and plastic bottle caps, toy boats, seashells, small sponges, feathers, paper, pebbles and empty and full containers

Things to remember during role play

Literacy:

Demonstrate how to role play guided discussion introducing the new words using the front and back cover. The child will decide how and where the toys will sit, what to do first at school and in the end, put the toys away. This dramatic play activity with props (the child’s toys) allows the child to retell the story. Encourage the parent to add to the dramatic play by adding extra props.

Math:

You should help the family decide what 20 concrete objects will be used to count with. Remind parents how important counting concrete objects are when learning to count.

Science:

Many homes may have the common ingredients for this activity, but you should be prepared to offer materials, if needed. Highlight words in your sample packet that may be new to a child and go over them with parents.

Gross Motor:

You may need to provide the balloon for this activity and help parents find household items that can be used as a racket. Make sure you role play keeping score by using tally marks. Go over basic balloon safety with parents.

Language:

This activity focuses on isolating a single letter sound. Make sure that parents understand how to make the “sss” sound properly.

Alphabet Book:

make a note to see if the **child** practiced writing uppercase and lowercase Nn, Oo and Pp.

Things to remember during role play

Literacy:

It is important for the child and parent to use language to describe what is happening in each picture. We are not just visually looking, but using language to express what is happening in each picture. These cards will be used in this week’s Language activity. Remind the parent to keep them in a safe place.

Math:

This is a good activity for reverse role play. Explain to parents to how use plates to group the beans into sets. Using concrete items to add and subtract, help the child connect with the abstract numbers and math symbols.

Science:

You should prepare your props to represent what will be common in the homes of the families they serve. Have ideas in mind for your family. Remind parents to be careful when cutting holes and slits into the containers. This activity will require preparation of the containers before actually doing the lesson.

Gross Motor:

A small washcloth can be used in place of the handkerchief. If the child cannot hope and balance the handkerchief have them tip-toe or walk fast.

Language:

Demonstrate to parents how to guide the child by reviewing the book and letting the child take the lead.

Alphabet Book:

Recommend that families practice R sounds by singing songs like “Row, Row, Row your boat”

HIPPY 10 Week Review:

Talk to **parents** about the 10 Week Review. Make sure that they are comfortable with the assessment before they use it.
